



# MODERN SLAVERY STATEMENT

The Neurodivergence Project is committed to combatting slavery and human trafficking in its lobbying, provision of services and supply chains, and we make this statement to assist with compliance with the Modern Slavery Act 2015. This statement relates to the financial year ending 2025.

As a charity we have a turnover of less than £36 million, and so we do not have a legal obligation to produce a modern slavery statement. However:

- a. We agree that exploitation within all supply chains ending in the UK is a blight on our society, and we are committed to playing our part in eliminating exploitation
- b. We understand that customers with obligations under the Modern Slavery Act 2015 cannot comply with those duties without our cooperation.

To that end, we confirm that we have examined all of our services and activities and, to the extent that it is reasonably practicable, businesses within our supply chain and we confirm the following:

- a. We confirm that within our own business, no relevant offence relating to slavery or human tracking has been committed.
- b. We have made enquiries of businesses that supply directly to us and we are confident that no relevant offence is committed in that business.



c. Insofar as it was reasonably practicable, we have examined our supply chains and can confirm that we have found no evidence of slavery or human trafficking.

Further details about our business and supply chain are provided below.

We have no employees, but engage regularly with trustees, freelance team members, and a small number of volunteers.

We operate in the United Kingdom.

We are a small charity with a limited number of suppliers.

We review suppliers to ensure they meet our ethical standards, to include modern slavery.

We understand that certain industry sectors and geographical regions entail greater risk of exploitation than others.

We do not believe that our supply chain is in one of those sectors.

Where it is reasonably practicable, we ensure that businesses in our supply chain have made a similar statement relating to slavery and human trafficking.

We also encourage all of our trustees, team members and volunteers to report on any matters relating to slavery or human trafficking in our supply chains of which they become aware.
